The Headteacher's report — Dr Llinos Jones

This is yet another extremely successful academic year. Our strong exam results have seen us reach the top for school in the County, family and Wales. I would especially like to thank the pupils, parents and staff for their hard work and commitment. The teachers and students have continued to work hard in order to maintain the high standards set in Ysgol Bro Myrddin over the past decade. Our success has led to us being chosen by the Welsh Assembly Government as one of the new pioneer schools in Wales as sharing our good prac-

tice for teaching and learning.

Many of our other successes were also noted on the school website and in our local partners and through Twitter and Facebook. You will also see a list of other successes in this report. We are pleased to be able to report on a wide range of achievements secured by our talented pupils.

The Governors are also determined to ensure that the staff, middle leaders and the senior leadership team are answerable via the range of commitments who meet regularly to discuss policy and school activities.

We look forward to a future of excitement under the guidance of our Senior Leadership Team. Our aim is to maintain and raise the school's high standards by offering a vast choice of curriculum and extra-curricular experiences.

We are also looking towards the future with great excitement as the consultation relating to changing the school language category from 2A Category to Welsh Medium Category progresses on.

During the year substantial investment has been made in digital learning resources with the establishing of Wi-Fi and more broadband in the school. Over 50 iPads have been purchased and staff have started building on the work that has already been completed in order to make the best use of this technology within the classroom. We are continually looking to develop digital learning and at present we are moving towards selecting 'digital learners' within the pupils. During the next year we will be using the expertise of these leaders in order to move on further.

It is important that we continue to be open and honest on every aspect of improving the school and in our opinion, the opinion of pupils and parents is an integral part of that. We are developing 'The pupil's Voice' in every aspect of the school life and act on the results. We have plans to strengthen the voice of the school council, years' council and the sports council. We are eager to ensure that we are aware of the opinion of everyone who is connected with the school. Therefore, we ask you to use the questionnaire that's distributed during parents' evenings in order for us to know your opinion on our performance.

Communication is key to use and we are updating our website on a daily basis to ensure usefulness. Visit these to receive the latest information about the school. Progress on recommendations in the Estyn Inspection Report 2009

A1. Continue to refine the school's procedures for tracking pupils' performance against targets to ensure they are robust enough to enable clearer identification of underachievement

We now have a system to monitor and track record of success for all pupils from Yr 7 to 13. The targets and the challenge are set based on past performance and predictive data, for example, FFT. These targets are shared with pupils and teachers assess pupils' work against these expectations. By using a traffic light system we also recognize the underachievers and the more able and talented pupils and we ensure that they are challenged to reach the highest possible standards. With underachieving pupils the school addresses the reasons for the underachievement in order to ensure that all pupils reach their full potential

A2. Continue to work closely with the Local Education Authority to provide suitable facilities for the Physical Education, Music and Drama departments and to provide adequate facilities for sixth form dining

In September 2010, we officially opened the new Drama department on the school site. September 2011 saw the opening of Panedini, the sixth form cafe. The cafe is open from 9.30 to 3.00 and provides a place for pupils and staff to have a snack, lunch, coffee and a chat. It also can be a workroom for the pupils. September 2012 also saw a new development with the opening of the Music department. Substantial investment has also been made to the fitness room for the Physical Education Department in 2013. We have therefore achieved Estyn's recommendations.

A3. Implement a more rigorous system for raising attendance levels

The school's attendance rate has been consistently high and has improved further in 2014/15 with the appointment of a new Assistant Head responsible for attendance in May 2014. Honest communication with parents has also seen progress. This is an aspect that the school has worked hard to improve and the data shows the success. There has been a substantial increase in pupil attendance since the last inspection. By now the school's attendance rate is 95.5%, compared with 91% for the County and 91.4% for Wales. The rate of unauthorized absence is very low at 0.1%, much better than the county rate (0.8%) and national rate (1.5%).

Links with the community

The school is used regularly by external clubs and societies. We have worked closely with the Urdd and 5x60 officer to provide Welsh medium provision programs outside school hours or during school holidays.

We also have close ties with our School Liaison Officers, PC Cath Williams. She has supported us very well in our PSE program and has worked very closely with our Heads of Year and the SLT. Her advice and work has been invaluable to us. A host of guest speakers come to the school annually to offer assistance including representatives of local banks, businesses and colleges.

Our humanitarian committee work hard each year to raise significant amounts of money to humanitarian causes locally and nationally. Yr 12 do voluntary work in the community on an annual basis to support numerous associations such as Radio Glangwili, Arthritis Research Shop, The Red Cross Shop, Tenovus Shop, Plant Dewi, Glangwili Hospital, Whitemill School, Barnardos Shop, Oxfam Shop and Wales Air Ambulance.

Annual Report - Finance

The Governors hold a sub-committee for Finance and Buildings which meets once a term to discuss these specific subjects. In the year 2014-15 the school succeeded again to finish the fiscal year within budget. However, following a reduction in the budget for Carmarthenshire Council by central government, the amount of money which had been given by the Council to the school for 2015-16 means that the school must find savings of up to £160,000. We were able to make vital savings whilst ensuring that our standards were not affected. However, we already know that we will have to find further savings of £300,000 for the financial year 2016-17. Therefore there is quite a challenge facing the SLT and Governors.

Toilets

Toilet facilities are regularly audited and is part of the cleaning contract with the Authority. Pupils, by completing a questionnaire and through the School Council, will contribute to the monitoring of the quality of these facilities. We have acted on the results of the questionnaire by employing a cleaner on site during the day to focus on cleaning the toilets.

Notes on Healthy Schools

We have committed to Healthy Eating and Drinking in Schools that incorporate the guidance for 'Appetite for Life'. This came into force in September 2013. It sets out the strategic direction and actions required to improve nutritional standards of food and drink sold in our school. We have supported the implementation of this Catering service to ensure that all food and drink at our school will comply with the measure. Healthy eating is promoted through Food Technology, Biology and PSE lessons. Consistent messages are provided by the staff in terms of food and drink at school and off site. We now aim to reach Stage 5 Healthy Schools.

Discipline

School rules are needed to protect standards within the school. They are based on the central ideas of self-respect, respect for others, and common sense. The rules are discussed in the tutorial lessons and all pupils are expected to comply. High standards of discipline are ensured by implementing a clear system of discipline to pupils that do not comply. Any misconduct is dealt with firstly by the subject teacher followed by the Head of Department and Head of Year. If the misconduct continues, the pupil is put in lunchtime detention. If this happens more than three times then the parents are notified that the pupil will be kept in suspension after school. Pupils may be suspended from attending the school in accordance with Welsh Government guidance. The school's positive behavior policy ensures that very few children have discipline problems.



The school operates a clear policy in dealing with issues of bullying and responds immediately if such a problem arises.

Health and Safety

The school's Health and Safety policy reflects the desire of the Governing Body to ensure a secure site for pupils and staff alike. All categories of employment are represented on the Health and Safety Committee. This committee reports to the Governors Health and Safety Committee. It is emphasized to all staff to report any deficiencies or hazards immediately to the Health and Safety Officer.

The School Prospectus

The School Prospectus is annually changed to incorporate any changes required by the Welsh Government and other relevant bodies. A copy is given to the parents of children entering school for the first time or transferring from another school. Copies are available on the school website or a hard copy can be obtained from the school office.

Special arrangements in terms of accessibility for pupils, staff and parents with disabilities


The Governing Body has adopted a School Equality Plan. This plan will ensure that arrangements are being made by the school to ensure that pupils (or other stakeholders of the school) with disabilities will not be treated less favorably than others.

Medium of Teaching and Language Policy

All National Curriculum subjects are taught and assessed through the medium of Welsh at Bro Myrddin and the medium of teaching, namely Welsh, is the norm to the great majority of pupils who choose Bro Myrddin as a secondary school. With respect to Science a language choice has existed since founding the present Language Policy. In September 2015 the pupils who entered Yr 7 study Science in Welsh if they studied the subject in Welsh in their primary schools. A minority of pupils have chosen to study Science in English, and have done so for several years. In September a chosen language existed with respect to Mathematics. In each of these classes, it is emphasized that the understanding of mathematics is the most important thing to ensure high standards in the subject and not the attention to the medium of teaching and learning. Now every pupil studying Maths KS3 and KS4 do so in the Welsh language. In Welsh medium KS3 Science and Mathematics lists of terms and subject vocabulary are provided in both English and Welsh. Additional English medium resources, books and ICT as well as Welsh are regularly used to enhance language development, scientific and mathematical pupils. This ensures that all pupils are able to discuss the subjects in Welsh and English, and eliminates any concern that may exist among those who believe that scientific and mathematical education in Welsh only will make it difficult for pupils to adapt to the context of English medium science and mathematics after leaving school. Also the departments are currently preparing online resources to aid non Welsh speaking parents to help their children.

The Welsh Language

Welsh is the school's official language for extracurricular activities and the vast majority of academic lessons. The school is proud of its Welsh ethos and acts to ensure that this is maintained for each new cohort of pupils. Pupils who choose to attend the school are encouraged to speak Welsh around the school, in extracurricular activities and lessons that are taught through the medium of Welsh. Parents are asked to support the school in this respect by encouraging their children to speak Welsh, to respect the school's Welshness and to do their best to promote this at all times. The school operates on targets set by Carmarthenshire's Strategic Language Plan to move with the linguistic continuum.



Policies

Three new policies were adopted by the Governing Body in their latest annual meeting which are a new security policy, namely 'site security policy', 'safer recruitment policy' and 'DBS policy'.

SEN Report 2014-15

Our goal at Bro Myrddin is to teach pupils with SEN alongside their peers in the mainstream as far as it is practicable. In order for children to receive a differential Curriculum, at times they may be withdrawn from classes temporarily, to focus on some key aspects of the work such as basic literacy and numeracy skills. This is done on the basis of standardized tests and reports received from the education authority officials and heads of primary schools and after discussions with the parents.

Mrs Caroline Walton, our school Co-ordinator for ALN is responsible for planning and coordinating provision for pupils with special educational needs and is also responsible for organizing the work of the support staff. Statements are reviewed annually at a meeting arranged with parents and the county support service. Mrs Lynwen Roberts has been named as governor for ALN.

A profile on each pupil on the SEN register has been created. The profile gives us the view of the individual pupil, the factors that affect their learning in lessons, the results of any standardized tests and teachers targets.

A large number of SEN pupils now receive access arrangements in internal and external examinations. Computer readers are also available. This enables the pupils sitting English or Welsh Language to hear the text being read aloud. Therefore, pupils who have weak reading but good comprehension skills can have access to English and Welsh language papers for the first time.

A reading workshop for less confident readers called 'Literacy Toolbox' was developed during the year. The scheme uses computers and special teaching methods to promote reading and spelling skills. There has been significant improvement in the reading age of the pupils who participated in the scheme.



Pupil welfare

We have a team of people who work to the benefit of pupils. Four members of the Senior Leadership Team have been trained as Child Protection Officers – Dr Llinos Jones, the Headteacher; Mr Euryn Madoc Jones, Deputy Headteacher; Miss Zelda Williams and Mr Jonathan Thomas, Assistant Headteachers. The Heads of Year play a vital role, as do the youth officers, the first aid assistant, the school health nurse, learning coaches and school counselors. Our two school counselors Mrs Netta Thomas and Mrs Zena Cooper saw 26 pupils this year. The Peer Mentoring scheme, a scheme to train pupils in the sixth form to work with vulnerable children is going from strength to strength.

Sports

The Governors believe that the school's main sports goals were realized which were to:

- Provide a safe and stimulating environment where pupils can work towards gaining maturity.
- Develop physical skills.
- Promote awareness of the importance of exercise for health.

Many activities offered by the department and the 5x60 officer including rugby, football, athletics, cricket, tennis, gymnastics, orienteering, badminton, aerobics, cross country, netball, creative dance, canoeing, rafting, rounders, skiing, outdoor activities, hockey, basketball, touch rugby, volleyball, circuit training, weight training, climbing, mountain biking and mountaineering. In addition, many pupils complete Bronze, Silver and Gold Duke of Edinburgh annually. The success of our pupils on the playing fields at school and extracurricularly is exceptional with several individuals reaching national standards.

Since last year the school have appointed a Sports Council following a ballot by the school pupils. The council's role will be to lead and advise the SLT on any issues related to the field.

Achievements

We have an active humanitarian committee of 70 sixth form pupils. This year we collected over £6,000 for various good causes.


Annual Parents Meeting

Since May 2013 the new arrangements are in place in terms of full annual meeting of governors / parents. Rather than having to hold a Governing Body meeting with parents, parents have the right to request a meeting with the Governing Body on issues of concern. Parents can exercise this up to three times during the school year, provided that the purpose of the meetings is to discuss matters relating to the school, not the progress and achievement of individual pupils or complaints regarding staff members or members of Governing Body. A meeting will be arranged with the Governor if 10% or 30 of the parents ask in writing for a meeting using section 94 of the School Standards and Organisation (Wales) Regulations 2013.
