

Headteacher's Report

This is certainly a year that has never been seen before. Things continued as usual until the end of March and then it all stopped. Our lives were subsequently ruled by the pandemic and we are still in its clutches eight months later. Many new skills were learned during the period and a great resilience was developed in our staff, pupils and parents.

In terms of exam results it has been a particularly challenging year. Although pupils were diligently prepared for their external examinations, these examinations were not observed. The results period was a very turbulent time but a light was seen beyond the tunnel and everyone eventually received their deserved grades.

A week before lockdown I was fortunate enough to host a successful St David's Day concert with the Three Welsh Tenors and school choirs. The Lyric was packed with parents and friends and there was a vast array of music. There have also been many successes recorded on the school website and in our local papers and through Twitter, Facebook and Instagram. You will also see a list of successes and events as part of this report. We are proud to be able to report on a wide range of achievements obtained by our talented pupils and staff.

The co-operation over the lockdown period has been tremendous with daily communication between the school and parents and staff. Even during that time there were successes with the Eisteddfod T, the virtual staff choir and also the work of the humanitarian committee. The Coast Challenge for Heroes will certainly be remembered by everyone when staff and pupils worked together to raise a substantial amount of money of nearly £2,500 for Glangwili hospital.

Our aim annually is to maintain and raise the school's high standards by offering a choice of a broad curriculum and extensive extra-curricular experiences. To achieve this, it is important that we remain open and honest about all aspects of school improvement and in our view, the views of pupils and parents are integral to that. We develop the Pupil Voice in all aspects of school life and act on the outcomes. We are planning to strengthen the voice of the School Council by improving our year councils as we are keen to ensure that we are aware of the views of everyone associated with the school. We therefore ask you to use the questionnaire that is distributed during parents' evenings so that we can discover what you think of our performance.

Communication is key to us and we update our website and social media platforms daily to ensure usability. Our new website is certainly more user-friendly and provides all the latest school details. Our digital journey is developing and we look forward to working with pupil digital leaders in the next academic year.

In conclusion, we would like to especially thank the Governors who give freely of their time to regularly attend various committees to discuss school policies and activities. We would also like to thank, on their retirement, two members of staff who between them gave 62 years of service to the school – Miss Zelda Williams our Assistant Headteacher and Mr Gwyn Jones, Head of Modern Foreign Languages.

Progress on Estyn recommendations in the 2015 Inspection Report

A1. Raising boys' standards of achievement

Raising boys' standards of achievement has been one of the priorities of our School Development Plan since 2015. Overall, the increase in boys' performance has been very good in both key stages, including all of the performance indicators at KS4. The gap between boys' and girls' performance has narrowed significantly in the majority of indicators.

A2. Strengthen and align the quality of teaching across the school and share best practice

The school's Development Plan since 2015 prioritises this recommendation and detailed plans are already in progress. The work of the Teaching and Learning Working Group has developed enormously and as a result there has been a clear increase in the quality of teaching.

A3. Develop the use and understanding of data among managers and governors

The recommendation has been a priority of the Development Plan 2016-17 and targets have been set. A series of bespoke data documents have been created to improve the awareness of teachers, middle managers and governors in relation to the school's performance data. In addition to the usual comparisons – the government data family, the free school meals benchmarking group (FSM) and the LA and Wales average – the analyses include comparing the school's performance (over a four-year period) against schools with the lowest FSM percentages. They also highlight the school's position in a range of indicators and in a wide range of ways, including the ERW Line of Regression and the Welsh Government. Permanent in-house training has been provided for teachers, middle managers and governors and as a result, the school's management and governors' awareness of school performance data in general, and the school's position, has improved significantly. Since 2016 that includes Heads of Department's awareness of the importance of AS/A level results and thereby, therefore, our use of ALPS data information.

A4. Sharpen the link between self-evaluation processes and planning for improvement

The recommendation has been a priority of the Development Plan 2016-17 and a new School Development Plan and Department Development Plan has been formed which lays firm foundations for its targets. These targets are also highlighted in the school's self-evaluation and there is a very definite link between the SDP and the self-evaluation that is also in its new guise.

Links with the community

The school is used regularly by external clubs and associations. We have worked closely with the Urdd, our 5x60 officer and our youth officer in order to provide Welsh-medium programmes of provision outside school hours or during school holidays. Our pupils contribute a great deal in the community by holding special evenings and assisting here and there.

We also have close links with our School Liaison Police Officer, PC Cath Williams. She has supported us very well in our PSE programme and has worked very closely with our Heads of Year and the Senior Leadership Team. Her ready advice and work has been very valuable to us. Annually a host of guest speakers come to the school to offer support including representatives from the local banks, local businesses and colleges.

Our humanitarian committee works an annual basis to raise significant amounts of money for local and national humanitarian causes.

Unfortunately, since the end of March, it has not been possible to continue with the normal arrangements.

Annual report - Finance

The Governors have a Finance and Buildings Sub-Committee which meets once a term to discuss these specific topics. In the year 2019-20, following the forecasts in last year's report the school was in deficit. The outlook for 2020-21 is much more supportive.

Attendance

This year, because of Covid-19, no governing body is required to report attendance.

Discipline

School rules are essential to protect order and standards within the school. They are based on the central notes of self-esteem, respect for others, and common sense. The rules are discussed in the tutorial lessons and all pupils are expected to comply. High standards of discipline are maintained by implementing a clear system of disciplining pupils who do not comply. The subject teacher deals with the pupil first and if this does not restore the situation the matter is discussed within the Department. If further dealing with the pupil is required, it will be referred to the Head of Year for further discussions before discussing a lunch hour suspension. If a pupil persistently misbehaves and is placed in a lunchtime suspension more than three times, then the parents are informed that a pupil is kept in an after-school suspension. A pupil may be prevented from coming to school in accordance with Welsh Government guidance. A positive behaviour promotion policy is implemented in the school and as a result, there is very little misbehavior within and outside the school walls.

The school operates a clear policy when dealing with bullying issues and responds immediately if such a problem arises.

Health and Safety

The school's Health and Safety policy reflects the Governing Body's aspiration to ensure a safe site for pupils and staff alike. All categories of staff employment are represented on the staff Health and Safety Committee. This committee reports back to the Governors' Health and Safety Committee. It is emphasised to staff that any shortcomings / hazards should be reported immediately to the Health and Safety Officer. There has been new protective fencing around the school since September 2018 which ensures the safety of the site and we hope to move forward to put fences around some of the school boundaries as well.

Special accessibility arrangements for pupils, staff and parents with disabilities

The Governing Body has adopted the School's Strategic Equality Plan. This scheme ensures that pupils (or someone else who is the school's stakeholders) with disabilities are less favourably discussed than others.

The School prospectus

The School Prospectus will be adjusted annually to include any changes required by the Welsh Government and other relevant bodies. Copies are available on the school website or by e-mail or if there are problems with that, a hard copy is provided on request to the school office.

Medium of Teaching and Language Policy

All National Curriculum subjects are taught and assessed through the medium of Welsh in the Vale of Myrddin and the medium of instruction here, namely Welsh, is, of course, the norm for most pupils who choose Bro Myrddin as a secondary school. All pupils in years 7, 8, 9, 10 and 11 study all subjects, except English, through the medium of Welsh. In terms of Science in years 12 and 13 language choice exists but with the establishment of the current language policy on an annual basis this will now change with the current year 7, 8, 9,10 and 11 continuing with its education through the medium of Welsh. All pupils at KS3, KS4 and KS5 study Mathematics through the medium of Welsh. In Science and Mathematics at KS3 subject glossaries and vocabulary are provided in both English and Welsh. In addition, Englishmedium as well as Welsh-medium resources, books and ICT are regularly used to enrich pupils' linguistic, scientific and mathematical development. This ensures that all pupils will be able to discuss the subjects through the medium of Welsh and English, and removes any distress that may exist among those who believe that science and mathematical education through the medium of Welsh alone can make it difficult for pupils to adapt to the context of Englishmedium science and mathematics after leaving school.

The Welsh Language

Welsh is the official language of the school for extra-curricular activities and most academic lessons. The school is proud of its Welsh ethos and is taking action to ensure that this is maintained for all new cohorts of pupils. Pupils who choose to attend school are encouraged to speak Welsh around the school, in extra-curricular activities and in lessons taught through the medium of Welsh. Parents are asked to support the school in this regard by encouraging their children to speak Welsh, to respect the Welshness of the school and to encourage them to do their best to promote this on all occasions. The school has acted on the targets of carmarthenshire's Language Strategic Plan to move the school along the linguistic continuum. As a result, the school has since September 2016 changed language category from 2A to CC. That means that all subjects except English are taught through the medium of Welsh.

Policies

All school policies were reviewed during the year.

Special Educational Needs Report 2019-20

Our aim at Bro Myrddin Welsh Comprehensive School is to educate pupils with Special Educational Needs alongside their mainstream peers as far as is practicable. Although children have received a differentiated curriculum, there will be times when pupils are temporarily taken out of classes, in order to focus on some key aspects of the work such as basic literacy and numeracy skills. This is done on the basis of standardised tests and reports received from education authority officers and primary school headteachers and after discussion with lone parents.

Mr Dyfed James, the school's Additional Learning Needs Co-ordinator is responsible for planning and co-ordinating provision for pupils and special educational needs and organising the work of the support staff. The statements are reviewed annually, at a meeting arranged with the lone parents and county support services.

Mrs Anne Loughran has been named as an associate governor for the department. There are 83 pupils on the SEN register classified as follows.

A profile has been created on each pupil on the SEN register which is the PCP (Person Centred Plan). The PCP shows the views of the individual pupil, the factors that affect their learning in lessons, the results of any standardised tests and teachers' targets.

Many pupils on the SEN Register now accept access arrangements in their external and internal examinations. A computer reader has been introduced to pupils who are entitled to a reader. This enables pupils sitting English or Welsh Language to hear the text read aloud. Therefore, pupils with weak reading skills but good reading and understanding skills can access Welsh and English language papers for the first time.

Several specialist workshops are held by the Department including the Literacy Toolbox workshop, Letters and Sounds, Touch Type and individual support.

Pupil welfare

We have a team of people working for the benefit of the pupils. Four members of staff have been trained as child protection officers – Dr Llinos Jones, the headteacher; Mr Euryn Madoc Jones, deputy head; Mr Jonathan Thomas and Mrs Rhian Carruthers, assistant heads. The heads of year play a vital role, as does the youth, attendance, health and

welfare officer, school health nurse and counsellors. The school counsellors Mrs Netta Thomas and Miss Alex Davies saw 29 pupils this year, which is significantly lower than normal due to the lock-up period. The Peer Mentoring scheme, a scheme to train sixth form pupils to work with vulnerable children, is going from strength to strength.

Sports

The Governors believe that the school's main sporting aims have been to:

- Provide a safe and stimulating environment for pupils where they could work towards overall maturity
- Developing physical skills
- Promote awareness of the importance of health in practice.

A host of activities are offered by the department and the 5x60 officer including rugby, football, athletics, cricket, tennis, gymnastics, orienteering, badminton, aerobics, cross-country, netball, creative dance, canoeing, rafting, rounders, skiing, outdoor activities, hockey, basketball, touch rugby, volleyball, circuit practice, weight exercise, climbing, mountain biking and mountaineering. In addition, many pupils complete the Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Award annually. The success of our pupils on the playing fields in the school and extra-curricular with several individuals reaches a national standard. The school now has a Sports council elected by a vote of the pupils. The role of the Sports Council will be to lead and advise the SLT on any matters relating to the field. Unfortunately, since the end of March many of our sporting development hopes to have not been realised.

Successes

The school also delights in the academic and extra-curricular achievements of our pupils, not only on the playing fields but on national platforms and in the world of acting and the media.

Extra-curricular activities

On an annual basis our pupils are offered a host of extra-curricular experiences to accompany their academic studies. Numerous tours, various workshops, interesting competitions, guest speakers, annual conferences and opportunities of all kinds are held.

Humanitarian committee

We have an active humanitarian committee of 70 sixth form pupils. Although this year was very different to previous years, the committee has been busy during the lockdown period and has raise £5,022.

Toilet Facilities

Toilet Facilities are checked regularly and form part of the cleaning contract with the Authority. Pupils, by completing a questionnaire and through the work of the School Council, contribute to monitoring the quality of these facilities. We have acted on the results of the questionnaire by employing a cleaner on site during the day to focus on cleaning the toilets.

Notes on Healthy Schools


We are committed to the Healthy Eating and School Drinking Bill which incorporates the guidance for 'Appetite for Life'. This came into force in September 2013. It sets out the strategic direction and actions needed to improve the nutritional standards of food and drink sold in our school. We have taken this forward with the support of the Catering service to ensure that all food and drink in our school complies with the measure. Healthy eating is promoted through Food Technology, Biology and PSE lessons. Consistent messages are provided by staff in relation to food and drink in and off the school. We are now aiming to reach Phase 5 of Healthy Schools.

Annual Parents Meeting

Since May 2013 new arrangements are in place in respect of the governors / parents plenary meeting. Rather than a governing body having to hold an annual meeting with parents, parents have the right to request a meeting with a governing body on matters of concern. Parents can exercise this right up to three times during a school year, provided that the purpose of the meetings is to discuss matters relating to the school, not the progress and achievement of individual pupils or complaints about a member of staff or a member of the governing body. A meeting will therefore be arranged with the Governors if 10% or 30 of parents request a meeting in writing using section 94 of the School Standards and Organisation (Wales) Act 2013.

Parental Questionnaire

During our parents' evenings we ask parents to complete a questionnaire distributed on that evening. Unfortunately, this year, we did not hold several of our parents' evenings and, therefore, the results of the 2018-19 questionnaire are below.
