This is another successful academic year this year. The excellent exam results have seen us reaching the top for schools in the County, the family and Wales. It has been a particularly challenging year with all the changes to the GCSE exams. I would particularly like to thank pupils, parents and staff for their hard work and commitment. Progress on the recommendations in the Estyn Inspection Report 2015

A1. Raising Standards of achievement in boys

Rising the standard of achievement in boys has been one of the priorities in our School Development Plan since 2015. Progress in the achievement of boys, through and through, has been very good in the two key stages in 2016, including L2+ and the CSI in KS4. However, the gap between the performance of boys and girls is still significant in some indicators. The school recognizes that there is a need to continue to focus on the performance of boys to eliminate the gap in each indicator and to ensure that all pupils reach their potential. The school has long assumed that the gap in 2017 in KS4 will be significant. This was brought to the attention of ESTYN and ERW. That is not an 'overcrowding' aspect but to accept a unique situation that exists for academic and social reasons beyond the control of the school. However, from 2018 onwards the development line will rectify itself.

A2. Strengthening and harmonizing the quality of teaching across the school and share best practices

The School's Development Plan since 2015 prioritises this recommendation and already detailed plans are underway. A Teaching and Learning Working Group was established. In addition, 'learning triads' have been established to share and disseminate good practice across the school. The school was developed as a centre for the Olevi Outstanding Teacher Programme and the Improving Teacher Programme, and two teachers were trained as facilitators for the scheme. As a result, a 'development' plan was provided for specific teachers within the school, and a specific team of teachers was established to share good practice. As a result, when observing lessons and scrutinizing books consistently over the year, there was a clear increase in the quality of teaching.

A3. Developing the use of data and understanding among managers and governors

The recommendation was one of the 2016-17 Development Plan priorities and definite targets were set. A series of purposeful data documents were created to improve the awareness of teachers, middle managers and governors regarding school performance data. In addition to the usual comparisons – the government data family, the free school meals benchmarking group (FSM) and the LA and Wales average – the analysis include comparing the school's performance (over a four year period) against schools with the lower FSM percentages. They also highlight the school's position in a range of indicators and in a wide variety of ways, including the ERW Regression Line and the Welsh Government. Internal training was provided for teachers, middle managers and governors and as a result, the awareness of school managers and governors of school performance data in general, and the school's situation in particular, has improved significantly. Since 2016 this includes the heads of departments' awareness of the importance of AS / A Level results and thereby, therefore, our use of ALPS data information.

A4. Sharpening the link between self-evaluation processes and planning for improvement

The recommendation was one of the priorities of the 2016-17 Development Plan and a new Post-Inspection School Development Plan and a Departmental Development Plan was formed. The SDP now sets firm foundations for its targets and activities by summarizing the situation in relation to areas for development. Alongside targets and success criteria for each priority, this sets a baseline for the school to measure its progress effectively. At the end of each priority within the SDP, the school has set a series of very purposeful questions – milestones – to ensure that the school is making good progress against the success criteria. There is clear evidence in the records of each full governing body that standards have been discussed.

Toilet Facilities

Toilet facilities are regularly audited and are part of the cleaning contract with the Authority. The pupils, by completing a questionnaire and through the School Council, contribute to the monitoring of the quality of these facilities. We have acted on the results of a questionnaire by employing an onsite cleaner during the day to focus on cleaning the toilets.

Notes on Healthy Schools

We are committed to Healthy Eating and Drinking in Schools that incorporate the guidance for 'Appetite for Life'. This came into force in September 2013. It sets out the strategic direction and actions required to improve nutritional standards of food and drink sold in our school. We have implemented this action with support from the Catering service to ensure that all food and drink at our school complies with the measure. Healthy eating is promoted through Food Technology, Biology and PSE lessons. Consistent messages are provided by the staff in terms of food and drink in school and off-site. We now aim to reach Stage 5 of the Healthy Schools award.

Discipline

School rules must be in place in order to safeguard routine and standards within the school. They are based on the central ideas of self-respect, respect for others, and common sense. Rules are discussed in tutorial lessons and all pupils are expected to comply with them. High standards of discipline are maintained by implementing a clear system of disciplining if pupils do not comply. The subject teacher deals with pupil first and if this does not resolve the situation, the issue is then discussed within the Department. If there is a need to deal further, the pupil will be referred to the Head of Year to hold further discussions before discussing lunchtime detention. If a pupil misbehaves constantly and is set on lunchtime detention for more than three times, we will then notify the pupil's parents and the pupils will be kept in after school detention. We may suspend a pupil from school in accordance with Welsh Government guidance. The school implements a positive behaviour policy and because of that, misbehaving within and outside the school walls are very rare.

The school operates a clear policy in dealing with issues of bullying and respond immediately if a problem arises.

Health and Safety

The school's Health and Safety policy reflects the Governing Body's desire to ensure a secure site for pupils and staff alike. All staff employment categories are represented within the staff Health and Safety Committee. This committee reports back to the Governors' Health and Safety Committee. It is emphasized to the staff that they should immediately report to the Health and Safety Officer if any defects / hazards arises.

Special arrangements in terms of accessibility for pupils, staff and parents with disabilities

The Governing Body has adopted the School's Strategic Equality Plan. This plan will ensure that pupils (or other stakeholders of the school) with disabilities will not be treated favourably than others.

School Prospectus

School Prospectus is modified annually to include any changes required by the Welsh Government and other relevant bodies. Copies are provided to the parents of children entering the school for the first time or transferring from another schools. Copies are available on the school website or by e-mail or if there are problems with that, a hard copy is available from the school office by request.

Medium of Teaching and Language Policy

At Bro Myrddin the National Curriculum subjects are taught through the medium of Welsh and to the great majority of pupils choosing Bro Myrddin as high school, the norm of teaching is namely Welsh. With regards to Science a choice of language has existed since founding the Language Policy. In September 2015 the pupils starting in Year 7 studied Science in Welsh if they studied this subject in Welsh in their primary school. A minority of pupils have chosen to study Science in English, and this has been true for several years. In September 2015 a chosen language was set for Mathematics. In each of these classes, it is emphasized that the understanding of mathematics is what's important in order to ensure high standards in the subject rather than the attention paid to the medium of teaching and learning. Every pupil studying Maths in KS3 and KS4 do so through the medium of Welsh. Lists of terms and subject vocabulary, in both English and Welsh are provided for the Welsh language Science and Mathematics classes in KS3. In addition, English ICT books and resources will be regularly used alongside Welsh in order to enhance the language, scientific, and mathematical development of pupils. This ensures that all pupils can discuss the subjects in Welsh and English, and it eliminates any concern that may exist among those who believe that scientific and mathematical education through the medium of Welsh only, makes it difficult for pupils to adapt to the context of science and mathematics through the medium of English after leaving school. The departments are currently preparing online resources to assist non-Welsh speaking parents to help their children.

The Welsh Language

Welsh is the official language of school for extracurricular activities and the vast majority of academic lessons. The school is proud of its Welsh ethos and acts to ensure that this is maintained for each new cohort of pupils. Pupils who attend the school are encouraged to speak Welsh around the school, in extracurricular activities and in lessons that are taught in Welsh. Parents are asked to support the school in this regard by encouraging their children to speak Welsh, to respect the school's Welshness and encourage them to do their best to promote this at all time. The school operates on Language Strategic Plan targets Carmarthenshire to take us along the linguistic continuum. The result of that is that the school since September 2016 have changed the language of category 2A to BC. That means, that all subjects except English are taught in Welsh.

Policies

Five new policy were adopted by the Governing Body during the year being 'capability procedure for teachers and headteachers', 'mental health policy,' 'controlled assessments policy', 'no-exam assessment policy', 'internal appeals policy – external qualifications', and 'Contingency Plan - exams.'

Special Educational Needs Report 2016-17

Our aim at Ysgol Gyfun Gymraeg Bro Myrddin is to teach pupils with special educational needs alongside their peers in the mainstream as far as is practicable. In order for children to receive a differentiated curriculum, there will be times when pupils are withdrawn from classes temporarily, in order to focus on certain key aspects of the work such as basic literacy and numeracy skills. This is done on the basis of standardized tests and reports received from the education authority officials and heads of primary schools and after discussions with the parents.

Mrs Caroline Walton, the school's Additional Learning Needs Coordinator is responsible for planning and coordinating the provision for pupils with special educational needs and organize the work of the support staff. The statements are reviewed annually, at a meeting organized with individual parents and the county support service. Mrs Caroline Walton retired at the end of the academic year after 20 years of praiseworthy service. Mr Dyfed James will be our new co-ordinator.

Mrs Anne Loughran has been named as a contact governor to the department.

A profile was created on all pupils on the SEN register which is the PCP (Person Centred Planning). The PCP shows the view of an individual pupil, the factors that affect their learning in lessons, the results of any standardized tests and teachers' targets.

A large number of pupils on the SEN register have access arrangements in their external and internal examinations. The computer reader was introduced to the pupils who are entitled to a reader. This enables the pupils sitting Welsh or English language to hear the text being read aloud. Thus, the pupils with weak reading skills but good comprehension skills can access Welsh and English language papers for the first time.

A reading workshop was developed for less confident readers during the year, 'Literacy Toolbox.' The scheme uses computers and special teaching methods to promote reading, handwriting and spelling. This showed a significant improvement in the reading age of the pupils involved in the scheme. A number of specialized workshops, including a workshop by the Department include handwriting; Fresh Start workshop; Literacy Toolbox workshop and Letters and Sounds workshop.

Pupil Welfare

We have a team of people working for the benefit of pupils. Four members of staff are trained as child protection officers - Dr Llinos Jones, Headteacher: Mr Euryrn Madoc Jones, Deputy Headteacher; Miss Zelda Williams and Mr Jonathan Thomas, Assistant Headteachers. The heads of year are playing a vital role, as does the youth officer, attendance officer, health and welfare, school health nurse and counsellor. Mrs Netta Thomas and Miss Alex Davies, the school counsellors, saw 46 pupils this year. The Peer Mentoring scheme, a scheme to train pupils in the sixth form to work with vulnerable children continues to go from strength to strength.

Sports

The Governors believe that the school's main sports goals have been realised:

- Provide a safe environment that stimulates the pupils where they can work towards general maturity
- Develop physical skills
- Promote awareness of the importance of exercise for health.

Many activities are offered by the department and the 5x60 officer including rugby, football, athletics, cricket, tennis, gymnastics, orienteering, badminton, aerobics, cross country, netball, creative dance, canoeing, rafting, rounders, skiing, outdoor activities, hockey, basketball, touch rugby, volleyball, circuit training, weight training, climbing, mountain biking and mountaineering. In addition, many of the pupils complete the Duke of Edinburgh Bronze and Silver Award annually.

The success of our pupils on the playing fields at school and especially for extracurricular activities with several individuals reach the national standard. Last year a Sports Council was formed will lead the role and advise the US on any issues related to the field.

Successes

The school is also delighted with the academic and extra curricular achievements of our pupils, not only on the playing fields but on the stages and in the world of acting and the national media.

Extracurricular Activities

Annually offers numerous extracurricular experiences for our pupils to coincide with their academic studies. Tours run numerous, various workshops, competitions and interesting guest speakers, annual conferences and opportunities of all kinds.


Humanitarian Committee
