Headteacher's Report

This year is yet another successful academic year. Very strong examination results have seen us reach the top for the County's schools, and the schools within our family and Wales. It has been a particularly challenging year with all the changes to the GCSE exams but overall there has been an improvement in each of the performance indicators. I would especially like to thank pupils, parents and staff for their hard work and commitment. Teachers and students have continued to work hard to maintain the high standards set at Ysgol Bro Myrddin over the last decade. We are one of Wales' new 'Pioneer Schools' under the Welsh Assembly Government scheme and many new schemes have been introduced. Currently we provide Humanities lessons for year 7, special Health and Wellbeing lessons for years 7 and 8 and preparations are underway to teach Financial Education lessons and First Aid lessons. We have now been awarded the Fairtrade Flag and continue with pioneering new initiatives in that area. We are also accredited as a Financial Education school. We are now part of the Institute's partnership with Aberystwyth University in training new teachers.

It was also a very special year for us with the school celebrating the 40th anniversary of the opening of the building at the school's old site in the town. There was a special celebration with a grand concert of the school choirs, Rhys Meirion and Heledd Cynwal at the Lyric Theatr and a CD was also recorded to commemorate the occasion. There have also been many successes recorded on the school website and in our local papers and through Twitter, Facebook and Instagram. You will also see a list of successes and events as part of this report. We are proud to be able to report on a wide range of achievements achieved by our talented pupils and staff.

Our annual aim is to maintain and raise the school's high standards by offering an option of a broad curriculum and extensive extra-curricular experiences. To achieve this, it is important that we remain open and honest about all aspects of school improvement and in our view, the views of pupils and parents are integral to that. We develop the Pupil Voice in all aspects of school life and act on the outcomes. We are planning to strengthen the voice of the School Council by improving our year councils as we are keen to ensure that we are aware of the views of everyone associated with the school. We therefore ask you to use the questionnaire distributed during parents' evenings so that we can find out what you think of our performance.

Communication is key to us and we update our website daily to ensure usability. Our new website is certainly more user-friendly and provides all the latest school details. We also have an app that can be used on any smartphone. Our digital journey is developing, and we look forward to working with pupil digital leaders in the next academic year.

In conclusion, we would like to especially thank the Governors who give freely of their time to regularly attend various committees to discuss school policies and activities. Thanks also to all the staff and to you parents.

Progress on Estyn recommendations in the 2015 Inspection Report

A1. Raising the standards of achievement in boys

Raising boys' standards of achievement has been a priority of our School Development Plan since 2015. Overall, the increase in boys' performance has been very good in both key stages in 2018/2019, including all the performance indicators at KS4. The gap between the performance of boys and girls has narrowed significantly in most indicators.

A2. Strengthening and harmonizing the quality of teaching across the school and share best practices

The School Development Plan since 2015 prioritises this recommendation and detailed plans are already underway. The work of the Teaching and Learning Working Group has developed tremendously and as a result there has been a clear increase in the quality of teaching.

A3. Developing the use of data and understanding among managers and governors

The recommendation has been a priority for the 2016-17 Development Plan and specific targets have been set. A series of bespoke data documents has been created to improve the awareness of teachers, middle managers and governors of the school's performance data. In addition to the usual comparisons – the government data family, free school meals (FSM) benchmarking group and LA and Wales average – analyzes include comparison of school performance (over four years) against schools with the lowest FSM percentages. They also highlight the school's position in a range of indicators and in a wide range of ways, including the ERW Regression Line and the Welsh Government. Ongoing in-house training has been provided for teachers, middle managers and governors and as a result, school managers and governors' awareness of school performance data in general, and the school situation, has improved significantly. Since 2016 this includes Heads of Department awareness of the importance of AS / A Level results and therefore our use of ALPS data information.

A4. Sharpening the link between self-evaluation processes and planning for improvement

The recommendation has been one of the priorities of the 2016-17 Development Plan and a new School Development Plan and Departmental Development Plan have been formulated which provides firm foundations for its targets. These targets are also highlighted in the school's self-evaluation and there is a very clear link between the SDP and the new-look self-evaluation.

Links with the community

The school is used regularly by outside clubs and societies. We have worked closely with the Urdd, our 5x60 officer and our youth officer to deliver programs of provision through the medium of Welsh out of school hours or during school holidays. Our pupils contribute a great deal in the community by holding special evenings and assisting.

We also have close links with our School Liaison Officer, PC Cath Williams. She has supported us very well in our PSE program and has worked very closely with our Heads of Year and Senior Leadership Team. Her ready advice and work have been invaluable to us. Every year a host of guest speakers come to the school to offer help including representatives from local banks, local businesses and colleges.

Our humanitarian committee works hard annually to raise significant sums of money for local and national humanitarian causes.

Annual report – Finance

The Governors have a Finance and Buildings sub-committee which meets once a term to discuss these specific topics. In 2018-19 the school again managed to finish the financial year within budget. The outlook for 2019-20 is more worrying and we are forecasting a deficit for the first time.

Toilet Facilities

Toilet Facilities are regularly inspected and form part of the cleaning contract with the Authority. Pupils, through the completion of a questionnaire and the work of the School Council, contribute to monitoring the quality of these facilities. We have acted on the results of the questionnaire by employing a cleaner on site during the day to focus on cleaning the toilets.

Notes on Healthy Schools

We are committed to the Healthy Eating and Drinking in Schools Bill which incorporates the 'Appetite for Life' guidance. This came into effect in September 2013. It sets out the strategic direction and actions needed to improve the nutritional standards of food and drink sold in our school. We have taken this forward with the support of the Catering service to ensure that all food and drink in our school complies with the measure. Healthy eating is promoted through Food Technology, Biology and PSE lessons. Regular messages are provided by staff regarding food and drink at school and off site. We are now aiming to reach Stage 5 of Healthy Schools.

Discipline

School rules are required to safeguard order and standards within the school. They are based on the central ideas of self-respect, respect for others, and common sense. The rules are discussed in the tutorials and all pupils are expected to comply. High standards of discipline are maintained through the implementation of a clear system of pupil discipline who do not comply. The subject teacher deals with the pupil first and if this does not alleviate the situation the matter is discussed within the Department. If the pupil needs to be dealt with further, he / she will be referred to the Head of Year for further discussions before discussing lunchtime detention. If a pupil misbehaves regularly and is placed in lunchtime detention more than three times, then parents will be informed that their pupil will be detained in an after-school detention. A pupil may be prevented from coming to school in accordance with Welsh Government guidelines. A policy of promoting positive behaviour is implemented in the school and as such, there is very little misbehaviour within and outside the school walls.

The school operates a clear policy when dealing with bullying issues and responds immediately if such a problem arises.

Health and safety

The school's Health and Safety policy reflects the Governing Body's aspiration to ensure a safe site for both pupils and staff. All employment categories of staff are represented on the staff Health and Safety Committee. This committee reports back to the Governors Health and Safety Committee. It is emphasized to staff that any defects / hazards should be reported immediately to the Health and Safety Officer. The school has been fitted with new protective fencing since September 2018 which ensures the security of the site.

Special accessibility arrangements for pupils, staff and parents with disabilities

The Governing Body has adopted the School's Strategic Equality Plan. This scheme ensures that pupils (or someone else who is a stakeholder of the school) with disabilities are not treated less favourably than others.

School Prospectus

The School Prospectus is modified annually to include any changes required by the Welsh Government and other relevant bodies. Copies are available on the school website or by email or if there are problems with that, a hard copy is provided on request to the school office.

Medium of Teaching and Language Policy

All National Curriculum subjects are taught and assessed through the medium of Welsh in Bro Myrddin and this teaching medium, Welsh, is of course the norm for most pupils who choose Bro Myrddin as a secondary school. All pupils in years 7, 8, 9 and 10 study all subjects, except English, through the medium of Welsh. Regarding Science in years 11 to 13, language choice exists but with the establishment of the current language policy on an annual basis this will change with the current years 7, 8, 9 and 10 continuing their education through the medium of Welsh. All pupils in KS3, KS4 and KS5 study Mathematics through the medium of Welsh. In Science and Mathematics at KS3, glossaries and subject vocabulary are provided in English and Welsh. In addition, English-medium resources, books and ICT as well as Welsh are used regularly to enhance pupils' linguistic, scientific and mathematical development. This ensures that all pupils will be able to discuss the subjects through the medium of Welsh and English, and removes any anxiety that may exist among those who believe that scientific and mathematical education through the medium of Welsh alone can make it difficult for pupils to adapt to the English-medium science and mathematics context after leaving school.

The Welsh Language

Welsh is the official language of the school for extra-curricular activities and most academic lessons. The school is proud of its Welsh ethos and acts to ensure that this is maintained for all new cohorts of pupils. Pupils who choose to attend school are encouraged to speak Welsh around the school, in extra-curricular activities and in lessons taught through the medium of Welsh. Parents are asked to support the school in this regard by encouraging their children to speak Welsh, to respect the Welshness of the school and to encourage them to do their best to promote this always. The school has acted on the targets of the Carmarthenshire Language Strategic Plan to move the school along the linguistic continuum. As a result, since September 2016 the school has changed language category from 2A to NC. This means that all subjects except English are taught through the medium of Welsh.

Policies

During the year one new policy was adopted by the Governing Body, the Teachers' Pay Policy 2018 and several other policies were updated.

Special Educational Needs Report 2018-19

Our aim at Ysgol Gyfun Gymraeg Bro Myrddin is to educate pupils with Special Educational Needs alongside their mainstream peers as far as practicable. Although children receive a differentiated curriculum, there will be occasions when pupils will be temporarily withdrawn, in order to focus on some key aspects of the work such as basic literacy and numeracy skills. This is done based on standardized tests and reports received from education authority officers and primary school headteachers and after discussion with parents.

Mr Dyfed James, the school's Additional Learning Needs Co-ordinator is responsible for planning and coordinating provisions for pupils with special educational needs and arranging the work of support staff. The statements are reviewed annually, at a meeting arranged with individual parents and county support services. Mrs Anne Loughran who has been named associate governor of the department. There are 79 pupils on the SEN register classified as follows.

A profile has been created for each pupil on the SEN register known as the PCP (Person Centered Plan). The PCP shows the views of the individual pupil, the factors that affect their learning in lessons, the results of any standardized tests and teachers' targets.

Many pupils on the SEN Register now receive admission arrangements in their external and internal examinations. Pupils who are entitled to a reader were introduced to a computer reader. This enables pupils who sit Welsh or English Language exams to hear the text being read aloud. Therefore, pupils with poor reading skills but good reading and comprehension skills can access Welsh and English language papers for the first time.

The Department holds several specialist workshops including a handwriting workshop; a Fresh Start workshop; RockStars TT workshop; Literacy Toolbox workshop and Letters and Sounds workshop.

Pupil welfare

We have a team of people working for the benefit of the pupils. Five members of staff have been trained as child protection officers — Dr Llinos Jones, the headteacher; Mr Euryn Madoc Jones, deputy headteacher; Miss Zelda Williams, Mr Jonathan Thomas and Mrs Rhian Carruthers, assistant headteachers. Heads of year play a vital role, as do the youth officer, attendance, health and welfare officer, school health nurse and counsellors. The school counsellors Mrs Netta Thomas and Miss Alex Davies saw 55 pupils this year. The Peer Mentoring scheme, a scheme to train sixth formers to work with vulnerable children is going from strength to strength.

Sports

The Governors are of the opinion that the main aims of the school sport have been realized, namely:

- Providing a safe and stimulating environment for pupils where they can work towards overall maturity
- Develop physical skills
- Promote awareness of the importance of health in exercise.

The department and the 5x60 officer offer a host of activities including rugby, football, athletics, cricket, tennis, gymnastics, orienteering, badminton, aerobics, cross country, netball, creative dance, canoeing, rafting, rounders, skiing, outdoor activities, hockey, basketball, touch rugby, volleyball, circuit training, weight training, climbing, mountain biking and mountaineering. In addition, many pupils complete the Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Award annually. The success of our pupils is on the playing fields at the school and extra-curricular especially with many individuals reaching a national standard. The school now has a Sports council that was voted on by the pupils. The role of the Sports Council will be to guide and advise the SLT on any issues relating to the field.

Successes

The school also prides itself on the academic and extra-curricular achievements of our pupils, not only on the playing fields but on national platforms and in the world of acting and the media.

Extra-curricular activities

Each year our pupils are offered a host of extra-curricular experiences to complement their academic studies. There are numerous tours, various workshops, interesting competitions, guest speakers, annual conferences and all sorts of opportunities.

Humanitarian committee


We have an active humanitarian committee of 70 sixth form pupils. This year £2,720 was raised for various good causes.

Annual Parents Meeting

Since May 2013 new arrangements have been in place for the full annual governors / parents meeting. Instead of a governing body having to hold an annual meeting with parents, parents have the right to request a meeting with a governing body on issues of concern. Parents can exercise this right up to three times during a school year, if the purpose of the meetings is to discuss school-related issues, not individual pupil progress and achievement or complaints about a member of staff or a member of staff governing body. Therefore, a meeting will be arranged with the Governors if 10% or 30 parents request in writing for a meeting using section 94 of the School Standards and Organization (Wales) Act 2013.
